The world can be a harsh place; we often need that reminder.

VIII. Prayer of Confession

Loving God,

From the very beginning, you breathed life into us and called us good. However, somewhere along the way we replaced "good" with "not enough." Somewhere along the way we turned the volume up on that phrase and began to doubt our own self-worth. Forgive us, for this is not what you have taught us. For when the world tells us we are not enough, you call us beloved. Show us how to return to that truth. Show us how to let go of our weariness and rest in that good news. Amen.

IX. Affirmation of Faith

I believe that the God I see in scripture is a God of love.

I believe that God created me and delights in that creation.

I believe the psalmist who says, "I am fearfully and wonderfully made." (Psalm 139)

I believe that, just as God called Jesus "beloved," God extends this same term of endearment to us.

I believe that no matter our earthly challenges, nothing could strip me of that sacred title.

I could fail every test, miss every goal, drop every ball, and I would still be God's beloved.

Therefore, I cling to this promise like a rock in the storm.

I anchor myself with this good news, allowing the anxiety of the day to roll over me as best I can, because I know where I belong.

I am a child of God.

I am beloved.

I strive to live this way.

XI. First Scripture Reading Matthew 2:1-12 (NRSV) (Amber McGill)

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

- What is Communion? Communion is a part of each Sunday morning where we remember the last meal that Jesus ate with the disciples by eating bread and drinking grape juice.
- May I receive Communion? Yes! Everyone is invited to receive -- we have no barrier to participating in communion.
- What's a "Doxology"? Some Sundays we will sing a "doxology" (literally "saying of glory") after we receive the offering. It is a prayer written in 1674 and is popular in Protestant Churches -- plus, we love the words.
- Do we say the Lord's Prayer together? We do pray the Lord's Prayer together occasionally on Sunday mornings during the prayer time.
- What else should I know? We'd love to share more of our loving and inclusive community with you. At FCC, you'll find all generations worshipping together and participating in church activities. We have activities for kids and youth, and we love to share in community together.
